

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The Texas General Land Office Community Development and Revitalization (GLO-CDR) program will oversee the administration of Community Development Block Grant disaster recovery (CDBG-DR) funds provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for recovery from the 2018 South Texas Floods (DR-4377) and the 2019 Disasters (DR4454 and DR-4466). There are three (3) counties eligible for 2018 South Texas Floods recovery funding and ten (10) counties eligible for 2019 Disasters recovery funding through this infrastructure competition process.

Each applicant may submit a total of two (2) applications, whether applying as the single applicant or jointly with another eligible jurisdiction(s). Depending on demand, no applicant will be awarded a second application until all successful eligible applicants have been awarded funding at least once.

The GLO reserves the option to delay award(s) to ensure that at least seventy (70) percent of funds benefit LMI persons and at least eighty (80) percent of funds address identified risks in the HUD MID areas of the 2018 South Texas Floods and 2019 Disasters, respectively.



Applications will be scored based on the following criteria. In the case of scores resulting in a tie, the application with the higher poverty rate will rank higher. More information on scoring can be found on the competition webpage.

The 2018 South Texas Floods and 2019 Disasters Infrastructure Competitions each have a maximum and minimum application amount.

Maximum Award Amount Per Application: \$1,000,000

Minimum Award Amount Per Application: \$250,000

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4.1 GLO Application Project Definition

For application purposes, A project is defined as a discrete combination of:

- · one entity (i.e., city or county),
- one activity (i.e., water, sewer, etc.),
- one project service area (beneficiary population)
- one HUD national objective.

A site is defined as a discrete location for the activity within a project. A project can have one or more sites.

Example: A City proposes sewer system improvements at three lift stations within their sewer service area. The entire sewer system is serviced by these three lift stations. The City is 58.42% LMI according to the current HUD LMISD. Each lift station is defined as a site for the sewer system improvements activity. The project service area is defined as city-wide, and the national objective is LMI.

Each project detail must provide sufficient information to clearly identify the proposed project, define the location, indicate whether acquisition (i.e., real property, easements, or rights-of-way) is required, clearly describe the scope of work, specify the populations who will receive benefit from the project, identify environmental assessment information, and outline funding detail to include any non-CDBG-DR funds to be used.



Economic revitalization or infrastructure activities must contribute to the long-term recovery and restoration of housing. All activities allowed under CDBG-DR; HCDA Section 105(a)(1-5), 105(a)(7-9), and 105(a)(11), including but not limited to:

- Flood control and drainage repair and improvements, including the construction or rehabilitation of storm water management system;
- Restoration of infrastructure (such as water and sewer facilities, streets, provision of generators, removal of debris, bridges, etc.);
- · Public facilities;
- Buyouts or Acquisition with or without relocation assistance, down payment assistance, housing incentives, and demolition;
- · Activities designed to relocate families outside of floodplains;
- Demolition, rehabilitation of publicly or privately owned commercial or industrial buildings, and code enforcement;
- Economic development (such as microenterprise and small business assistance, commercial rehabilitation, and special economic development activities, including prioritizing assistance to businesses that meet the definition of a small business). Any projects funding for-profit entities must be evaluated and selected in accordance with guidelines (established in Appendix A to 24 CFR part 570) developed by HUD and comply with HUD underwriting guidance;

- Public service (such as job training and employment services, healthcare, childcare, and crime prevention within the 15 percent cap) and;
- Planning.



TIGR Access

Applicants for CDBG-DR funding <u>must complete a TIGR Access Form a minimum of ten (10)</u> <u>business days in advance of creating an application</u> and must be aware of the potential impact on application deadlines. Applicants who already have valid/active subrecipient access will not need a new request for the 2018 South Texas Floods or 2019 Disasters CDBG-DR Infrastructure Competitions.

- TIGR Access Forms may be filled out by an applicant or Grant Administrator (GA) but can ONLY be submitted by the applicant.
- The application may be submitted by an authorized third-party vendor on behalf of the applicant.

If these proposed drainage improvements are not completed in Johnson Neighborhood, the households residing in the area will continue to be threatened by flooding events. These threats include loss of life, and damage to personal and real property. During the time of the weather event, the flooding within this neighborhood prohibited the residents from evacuating, and due to the high water, emergency services were not able to provide rescue to the individuals.

Rango County experienced vast flooding events throughout the County due to the 2018 flooding event. The City of Rango in particular saw water levels of 1-2 feet over 65% of the city limits. Johnson Neighborhood has historically been affected during large rain events, and the County has identified further mitigation efforts for this area and its surrounding areas within its most recently adopted County Hazard Mitigation Plan to complement the proposed improvements within the Texas GLO application.

Describe the current condition of the facilities that were damaged and describe any actions taken on the proposed project to address the damage(s). *

Immediately after the weather event city employees removed storm debris from the drainage ditches within Johnson neighborhood. At this time, the drainage capacity is still an issue, and must be resolved to alleviate future threats to the project benefit area.






As described earlier in the application, Johnson Neighborhood residents experienced loses to personal and real property due to the 2 plus feet of flooding within the neighborhood. The City of Rango saw in excess of 20 inches of rain over a 72 hour time period. This flooding also affected the existing ditches as it further eroded the earthen structures. Lastly this flooding impacted the ability for the residents to quickly return to work as they were required to tend to personal needs.

Currently Rango County has four Low Income Tax Credit supported properties. These properties remain to have a 2% vacancy rate. The City of Rango has two pubic housing complexes which are currently 100 % occupied.

Routinely the County of Rango will apply for NOFA's provided by the TDHCA and GLO. The County has applied during any and all funding rounds. In 2021, the County was successful in receiving funding out of the 2018/2019 ARP program which will create 150 units within the City of Rango

Rango County will look for ways to partner with developers, and will evaluate any and all impediments that may exists to not otherwise promote affordable and fair housing. As of 2021, Rango County is revising land use plans to ensure their is adequate land in preparation of multi-family awards.





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Housing Needs Assessment (Long Term Planning)

Applicants must develop their community recovery projects in a manner that considers an integrated approach to housing, fair housing obligations, infrastructure, economic revitalization, and overall community recovery. Consideration of long-term planning processes is also highly encouraged. Disaster recovery presents communities with unique opportunities to examine a wide range of issues including (1) housing quality and availability, (2) road and rail networks, (3) environmental issues, (4) the adequacy of existing infrastructure, (5) opportunities for the modernization of public facilities and the built environment, (6) the development of regional and integrated systems, and (7) the stimulation of the local economy impacted by the disaster. Applicants must provide a brief description of how the proposed project addresses an integrated approach to recovery. *

The County has applied for Public Assistance funding that will address a majority of street repairs around Johnson neighborhood. Coupled with intentions in the near future through FEMA-HMGP funding, the proposed drainage improvements will complete the necessary watershed improvements to alleviate potential flooding events for the eastern part of the City of Rango.

Considering the local post-disaster evaluation of hazard risks, responsible floodplain management, future extreme weather/natural disaster events, and long-term risks, describe how the proposed project promotes sustainable long-term recovery.

Hydrology modeling as already occurred and it has been determined that improvements within Johnson Neighborhood coupled with FEMA-HMGP improvements will nearly completely alleviate flooding events for this project benefit area. The close proximity of the City of Rango to the coast and surrounding watersheds make this city vulnerate to long duration rain events. This project will address all known and nearly all known future threats.

Describe how the proposed project is consistent with local and regional planning efforts to effect disaster recovery.


This project is inline with proposed mitigation efforts located in the County's adopted Hazard Mitigation Plan, and is a prime candidate for disaster recovery funding as it is a remaining unmet need present in this community.

Describe how the proposed project integrates mitigation measures into rebuilding activities and achieves objectives outlined in community-level and/or regional post-disaster recovery and mitigation planning to reduce future risk.

This project will coincide with a proposed retention area which, during high rain events, will act as expanded storage area to protect Johnson Neighborhood and ensure surrounding areas are not otherwise affected by the evacuation of water. Such activities are outlined in the County's adopted Hazard Mitigation Plan.


